Management of Seizures

POLICY:

- 1. During a seizure the student's physical safety will be ensured at all times
- 2. For any student whose seizure lasts more than 5 minutes an ambulance will be called (An exception will be made if a physician specifies in a physician's order)
- 3. An ambulance will be called immediately for any student with no history of seizure activity
- 4. Parents will be notified whenever any seizure activity has taken place
- 5. Two staff members should always be present when a student is seizing, one to care for the student and one to make phone calls if necessary
- 6. Students with a history of seizures are required to have individualized seizure plans

PROCEDURES:

During the Seizure:

- 1. If available, ask another staff member to notify nurse
- 2. Stay calm and track time with watch.
- 3. Keep the student safe by moving furniture or equipment away from the student
- 4. Do not restrain
- 5. Turn student gently onto one side. This will help keep the airway clear.

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- 6. Place a cushion or folding cloth beneath the head for protection.
- 7. Do not put anything in the mouth
- 8. Stay with the student until fully conscious.
- 9. During the seizure observe the characteristics of the seizure including the following:
 - a. Precipitating factors such as: fever, menses, bright lights, loud noises, etc.
 - b. Time of onset
 - c. Aura
 - d. Clinical progression of the seizure activity, i.e. from right arm twitching to generalized activity, skin pallor, cyanosis of tongue, to area around mouth
 - e. Loss of consciousness
 - f. Duration of motor activities
 - g. Post-ictal state (sleepy, lethargic, confusion, crying, vocalizing, headache)

After the Seizure:

- 1. Check the student for injuries and allow student to rest
- 2. Notify school nurse, if not already
- 3. Remain nearby until the student appears aware and alert
- 4. As per policy, inform parents that seizure activity has occurred

Seizures as Emergencies

A seizure is generally considered an emergency when:

• Tonic clonic seizure (characterized by loss of consciousness and violent muscle contractions) lasts longer than 5 minutes

- Student has repeated seizures without regaining consciousness
- Student is injured
- Student is pregnant or known diabetic
- Student has a first-time seizure
- Student has breathing difficulties
- Student has a seizure in the water

Off Campus Activities

- If seizure occurs off campus on a field trip or worksite, and a nurse is not present, 911 will be called
- Diastat CANNOT be administered by non-nursing staff.

Swimming

All students with a history of seizures are required to have:

- 1:1 Continual observation by a LABBB staff member in the pool with the student
- Flotation device
